

Iceland is a valued, active partner of the World Bank (WB) through its financial support. This partnership is generating results that are improving lives in low- and middle-income countries around the world.

In FY23, Iceland paid US\$5 million to International Development Association (IDA), US\$8 million to IBRD/IDA Trust Funds (IBRD/IDA TFs) and US\$2 million to Financial Intermediary Funds (FIFs).

By the end of FY23 Iceland had contributed to 15 active trust funds, including 10 IBRD/IDA TFs and 5 FIFs.


### Iceland and the International Development Association (IDA)

In December 2021, the global community renewed its strong support for IDA through a successful 20th replenishment. Development partners agreed to a record package of US\$93 billion for IDA20 (July 2022 – June 2025), scaling up the resources available to boost resilient recovery from the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic and build a greener, more resilient, and inclusive future. This could not have been achieved without Iceland's support which made the 37th largest contribution to IDA20 at US\$15 million. Its contribution will help IDA20 deliver its policy commitments on human capital; jobs and economic transformation; fragility, conflict and violence; climate change; gender and development; and crisis preparedness. IDA20 offers excellent value for money, with every US\$1 in total partner contributions resulting in almost US\$4 in financing to client countries.




### Iceland and IBRD/IDA Trust Funds

During FY19-FY23, Iceland contributed US\$16 million to IBRD/IDA TFs. All of Iceland's contributions paid-in were received from the Ministry for Foreign Affairs

Over FY19-FY23, 31 percent (US\$3 million) of disbursements from IBRD/IDA TFs supported by Iceland, were through Recipient-Executed Disbursing Accounts (REDA), of which 85 percent co-financed Bank projects. The remaining 69 percent (US\$8 million) were made through Bank-Executed Disbursing Accounts (BEDA).

Bank-executed (BE) activities through BEDA are performed by the World Bank, and constitute part of the Bank's work program (examples: Research, learning and advisory services and analytics). They also contribute to Bank's administrative expenditures.

 Recipient-executed (RE) activities through REDA support projects that are typically executed by county-level recipients, similar to IBRD or IDA financing. Like IBRD/IDA projects, Bank staff appraise and supervise the projects to ensure that the recipients execute them in accordance with World Bank policies and procedures.







### Iceland and Financial Intermediary Funds

Iceland's contributions paid-in to FIFs were US\$4 million over FY19-FY23. Approximately 7 percent of commitments by these FIFs were implemented by the World Bank. The remaining funds were implemented by other agencies.
